The Provincial Proficiency Scale

The use of the Provincial Proficiency Scale gives students, parents and caregivers a clear understanding of what students can do now and areas for future growth.

Reporting scales are already being used by all districts in the province. There are currently 17 or more known reporting scales in use. The introduction of the Provincial Proficiency Scale will provide consistency and alignment across B.C. schools.

What's new

- Student reporting practices that align with B.C.'s curriculum and provincial assessment system
- Provincial Proficiency Scale at Grades K-9
- Changing the "I" reporting symbol to "IE" to indicate "insufficient evidence" of learning instead of "incomplete" learning
- Student self-assessment of Core Competencies and goal setting, in all grades in the 3 written reports
- Graduation status updates at Grades 10-12
- All learners, including students with a disability or diverse ability, will receive regular communications of student learning in the same way as their peers in any other program

What is student reporting

Student reporting is the assessment and communication of student learning, often thought of as report cards. Every student in B.C. receives communications from the school throughout the school year that provide parents, caregivers, and students with information about student learning.

The way teachers and schools communicate student learning, and the format of traditional report cards is shifting.

Upcoming changes to student reporting

The K-12 Student Reporting Policy Framework ("the framework") is the result of many years of consultation and engagement with rightsholders, education partners, teachers, families, students, and the public.

The framework provides an overview of the upcoming changes to the K-12 Student Reporting Policy, set to be implemented in the 2023/24 school year.

Changes in reporting policies for BC schools

The other three classes will be electives or support blocks if you need them.

You will write TWO ministry exams – Literacy 10 and Numeracy 10 in either January or June

GRADE 11 SPECIFICS

What do you **need** to take in Grade 11??

- » English 11 will be a combo class Composition AND ______
- » Math 11 either "Workplace" OR "Foundations" OR "Precalculus" 3 options
- » Science 11 Life Sciences, Chemistry, Physics, Earth Science, Science for Citizens
- » Career Life Education unless taken in grade 10 or online

**one more Social Studies course is mandatory in EITHER Grade 11 or 12 **

Ministry exams are only written in Grade 11 if they were MISSED in Grade 10.

GRADE 12 SPECIFICS

What do you **need** to take in Grade 12??


- » English 12 "English Studies 12" OR "English First People's 12" OR "Advanced Placement English 12" (takes two blocks of schedule)
- » Career Life Connections AND Capstone (included, required to graduate)
- » Social Studies 11 or 12 (unless taken in Grade 11)
- » Indigenous graduation requirement info to come...

All other courses are considered "elective" but may still be academic choices for post-secondary!

All grade 12 students must write the Ministry Literacy 12 exam to graduate.

NEW THIS YEAR – British Columbia Indigenous Graduation Requirement

The goal of this new requirement is for students to graduate from the BC K-12 system with a greater breadth and depth of knowledge and understanding of Indigenous (First Nations, Métis, and Inuit) peoples, cultures, and histories in BC. Students should have multiple options to meet this requirement. Offering students choice, and therefore the option to take more than one course, aligns with provincial commitments to Truth and Reconciliation and to developing the Educated Citizen.

In School District 75, students will be able to meet the Ministry of Education requirement for the Indigenous-focused Graduation Requirement through any of the following options:

Big Ideas




Big Ideas





e completed a mathematical inventory this month. This was a small snapshot of skills from the K-9 math curriculum.



What is Work Experience?

The course has two parts:

- 1. Getting Ready activities (about 10 hours)
- Forms/activites to complete
- 2. Work Experience (about 100 hours)
- Work experience placements are based on student interests and can be paid or unpaid.
- Must be a standard work site and insured by WorkBC.
- Can be completed in 1–2 years.





What is Youth Work in Trades?

- Offers school and apprenticeship credits (16 credits)
- \$1000 scholarship once program has been completed.


