NEW PHONE LAWS AT MSS

A BIT OF BACKROUND...

In January, the Premier announced a directive expecting schools to include restrictions on the use of cell phones in their codes of conduct. Districts were given broad leeway on how to implement this; in our District, the Board is in the process of deciding a proper method of enforcement.

The first draft of a policy on tech use was presented to District Staff and Principals for feedback earlier this year. Please note that while it includes cell phones, it goes beyond that, into both 'personal digital devices' and school-owned technology as well. Staff is planning to consult with students and the public via EngageMPSD.

HOW WILL THIS AFFECT YOU?

We interviewed some people around the school to see what they think of the new phone policy; let's see what they had to say.



Counsellor Mrs. Hall:

The phones are useful for students in the classroom who are dealing with anxiety. They can just go on their phones and either reach out to their counsellors or go onto the Mindshift app when they are stressed. The phones are also not useful because students are overly dependent of them, and it causes disruptions in the classrooms. Overall, the phone policy could or could not be beneficial to our school

Counsellor Mrs. Nguyen:

The policy could or could not be beneficial to our school staff and students. It can make students' lives tougher and may make their mental health deteriorate. On the other hand, it could better the students and help them if they are battling with some addiction on their social media.



Teacher Mr. Gill:

I think this phone policy would be very hard to enforce. I would have no clue on how to enforce it without making the students go crazy. I think it should be up to the teachers like it was before. I think the phone policy would help with our student's social development because they would actually have to look at people and communicate with them. I think it's okay to use your phone as long as you communicate with your teacher first.

Sra. Vetter:

The phone policy is a fascinating creature, and it can be an amazing tool. It may be harder for teachers to access school technology when needed, so that is why it is easier for students to use their phones instead. I think the phones are fine if there are rules set in place, like there are now. If students and teachers respect each other, the phones aren't that much trouble.
